I realize there are many people at Cretin I should thank, but I will just note a few: Denny Fitzgerald was my guide through Cretin from day one. Tom Barrett taught me to use "exotic words," such as "obtuse angles" in a non-mathematical sentence, Steve Nachtsheim taught us all to be resourceful (remember when he needed wood for a stage set), and Jack Dale taught us that there can be life after sports. 



My years at Cretin were a wonderful experience. The education was a great preparation for college and the friendships made for fun times.




