
I taught for six years after college, spent many years in the travel industry and finished my working career with thirteen years in marketing for Grand Casino.

In retirement, I do a lot of reading, a little computer programming as a hobby, and quite a bit of playing with the grandkids. Overall, a pretty simple life.





It is hard for me to believe it has already been fifty years since we graduated with our high school diplomas on June 2, 1963. How ever so quickly the time has passed!

It was on June 11, 1963, that eleven young men from the Class of 1963 arrived on the CHS campus and boarded a bus to Winona, Minnesota, where we began our Novitiate—our training to become DeLaSalle Christian Brothers. We were housed in a building on the campus of Saint Mary's College (now Saint Mary's University) in a valley called St. Yon's. We were apart from college life during that year and some months, and, once first profession took place, we began our degree leading to a Bachelor of Arts. Way back then, the Brothers were many among us; during my course of first degree studies there were well over seventy living under one roof and as part of one community.

My first assignment was at Lourdes High School in Oshkosh, Wisconsin, and, after that, McDonnell Central High School in Chippewa Falls, Wisconsin. I began to think I may be in Wisconsin for a long time given we had several schools around the state back then.

In 1970, I was assigned to Archbishop Brady High School in West Saint Paul, Minnesota, and remained for eight years—first as a teacher but mostly as the Principal.

Once I was out of the classroom and into administration, I never returned to full-time teaching. I was again a Principal in Stevens Point, Wisconsin, for five years, and then I was appointed the Provincial of the Upper Midwest Province for three terms (nine years total), followed by six years as the Regional Director of our Institute of the Brothers of the Christian Schools located in Washington, DC.

After that, I was overseas as a missionary for fifteen years building up the Church through education by fostering local vocations and developing schools in Kenya, Ethiopia, Eritrea, Nigeria, and South Africa. In addition, for some time I offered direction and supervised our Brothers' efforts in the Holy Land, particularly Bethlehem University!

Approximately four years ago, I returned to the United States and had some sabbatical time, and now I am the person responsible for the ongoing development of the mission and for the promotion of advancement and special events in the Mid-South serving Christian Brothers University in Memphis, Tennessee.

Life has been full and most rewarding for me these fifty years, and I look forward to the next fifty! Congratulations to the Class of 1963. In our own way we have all made a difference in our world!




Charles R. Evans Chuck, Charlie
